After completing finals and kicking off summer vacation, 38 IHA students embarked on the annual IHA Europe Trip from June 18-27, taking an unforgettable journey to Spain and France. Our journey was organized by Ms. Ana Echeverría P'05 and chaperoned by Ms. Ellen Donoghue '76, Mrs. Maria Daly-Valls, Mrs. Jeannine Woolley P'20, and Mrs. Donna Sandt P'20, '23, '24.

We started our adventure in Madrid and our first two days were spent exploring iconic landmarks such as the Plaza Mayor, El Retiro Park Lake, and Royal Palace of Madrid, as well as the Prado and Reina Sofia Museums. Our group also had the chance to enjoy some authentic Spanish paella, the nation's unofficial national dish, before taking a walk to the historic Chocolatería San Ginés to sample the famous chocolate and churros.

We next visited the city of Toledo, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, where narrow roads with a charming atmosphere made us feel like we had traveled back in time. Our local guide walked us through many of Toledo's most noteworthy sites, including a Gothic Cathedral, the Church of Santo Tomé, and a historic Medieval Synagogue, highlighting the city's significant connection to Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

The next leg of our trip brought us to the city of Bilbao, where we had the chance to practice speaking the unique Basque language. While there, we visited the Guggenheim Museum, which was full of unique modern art pieces. To end our time in Spain, we enjoyed the picturesque coastal streets on our own and sampled some of the Basque region's renowned pintxos, which are akin to Spanish tapas and a staple at many local bars and restaurants.

We then crossed over the French border and made our way to the coastal city of Biarritz, where we enjoyed a dip in the Bay of Biscay and a stroll down the scenic boardwalk. Though Biarritz was breathtaking, we were all incredibly excited to board the high speed train that would take us to Paris the next morning!

### A Historic Season for Mock Trial

IHA offers an incredible number of organizations, making it easy for certain clubs to blend into the background when it comes to their accomplishments and the experiences offered. However, it is, of course, the students who shine the most light on the organizations and this is especially true when it comes to IHA's Mock Trial Club. Mock Trial is more than just a club; it is a team of dedicated students who collaborate and problem-solve in order to prepare for their courtroom competitions. With auditions happening in October and competitions occurring in February, lawyers have four months to develop their theory of the case, craft their opening and closing statements, and write their questioning for not only the witnesses they represent, but also the witnesses that they are cross-examining on the day of the trial. Witnesses also must craft a story for themselves using the information provided in their assigned affidavit and prepare to be cross-questioned by the opposing counsel.

While the process might seem complicated, the breakdown is simple. Each year, the entirety of Bergen County receives the same case. Each school then splits into two "teams," one whose job is to represent the defendant and one that represents the state as prosecutors. This year, the case was centered around a SWAT call, with teams working to analyze the defendant, who was accused of calling the police to a completely safe scene. Key players involved were the detectives who claimed to have traced back the call to the defendant, the first responders on the scene of the SWAT call, and the close friends of the defendant. Although the case may seem insignificant or even straightforward at first glance, unraveling different themes and ideas of the case through discussion, research, and group analysis enables students to incorporate skills that would otherwise not really be used in school. However, the ability to work with others is arguably the most important skill for students to strengthen while they are young, which is exactly what the Mock Trial Club teaches students.



Upon our arrival to Paris, we began our sightseeing immediately with a visit to the Opera district to enjoy lunch, a stunning view of the city from the rooftop of the Galeries Lafayette department store, and a unique tour of the Fragonard Perfume Museum. We then made our way to the Eiffel Tower and saw Paris in all its glory. We gathered together to watch the Eiffel Tower glow, a truly magical moment that will define the trip in our memories forever.

The next morning, we met up with a local guide and toured the beautiful Luxembourg Gardens, home of the seat of the French Senate. From there, we visited many of Paris' most iconic landmarks, including the Arc de Triomphe, the Luxor Obelisk, and Les Invalides. We closed a busy Parisian day with a visit to the Banks of the Seine for a relaxing, hour-long sightseeing river cruise.

We began our final day with an excursion to Versailles, which was just as grandiose and awe-inspiring as we had learned in history class. Our group had the chance to stroll through Versailles and explore the famed Hall of Mirrors, expansive grounds, and intricate gardens, including Marie Antoinette's Hamlet. The highlight of our visit to Versailles was our hour-long bike ride through the gardens, ending with a fun visit to the gelato cart.

Our European journey had been packed to the brim with once-in-a-lifetime experiences, cultural immersion, and bonding experiences, and there was no denying that we had done and seen everything we could have hoped for during our ten days abroad. Though the trip itself has come to a close, it has also sparked a new desire within us all to continue traveling, exploring, and learning, setting us up for a lifetime of continued discovery.
